





Thank you to all the car owners who brought their beautifully restored race cars to be displayed on the grass in front of the museum for all to enjoy.



The "Legends" Race Program: Aug. 26, 2015

gram at the fabulous Lincoln Speedway.

When the inevitable rumors began, it was just that... unbelievable. Getting former sprint car drivers, some out of the cockpit for more than 30 years, to hop in again and race each

other? Yeah, right. *Let me sell you a bridge*. Who would be crazy enough to do it? Well, think about this. These guys are all at least a bit "crazy," some well on the way. Do they ever get over it? Is that "spark" still there? let's try this and find out.

A lot of those on social media were saying "Yup-Rahmer?" Only Fred Rahmer could pull this off, but wow, just think: would these guys really race? How would this be done? Where would he get the cars? Two things for sure... a little "crazy" would help, and that "spark" is still there.

Well, let's face it. Fred Rahmer was turning the Sprint Car world upside down that year. After retiring from racing himself, he has fielded a sometimes 3-car team (Stevie Smith on a part-time money-race basis) he was also very successful along with two sons promoting races at Path Valley Speedway and these have been a huge success.

Now, he leased Lincoln Speedway in Abbottstown, Pa., and came up with a new concept. You could say he had become a breath of "fresh air," albeit with the smell of cheap beer in the air thrown in as well. Wow,what an idea. But will it work? Only one way to find out!

It was the perfect evening in Southcentral PA, the center of today's sprint car universe. We got there earlier— "we" being volunteers from the Eastern Museum of Motor Racing. Fred and his wife Debbie both told me that if they could get the famous **Lynn Paxton** to do this, then they could get *anyone*. There was a lot of truth to that. Paxton, of course is the guy who brought all the racing history together in this area to form EMMR. He last raced in 1983 at age 39. He was now 71. We didn't believe it. Well, like people always say: you can't make this stuff up.

How about Doug Wolfgang? Let's ask him, along with Cris Eash, Kenny Adams, Todd Shaeffer, Paxton's old teammate the great Keith Kauffman, Bobby Weaver, Steve Stambaugh, Steve Siegel, Jeff Shepherd, Billy Pauch, Steve Smith Sr., Van May, Bobby Allen, Van and "Scruffy" both said no. Doug Wolfgang also said no for personal family reasons. But twelve said **"YES."**

What about the cars? Where in the heck are they going to get the cars? "Leave that to me," said Fred. So somehow he gathers up 10 cars of his own. Not only that. They are going to be 410s! Is Tony Stewart in on this? No, he was not. But with Don Otts' help and others Fred pulled it off.

No junk, either. Safety first. Not only that, the cars these guys are to drive will be painted up like the ones they drove originally.

Fred's son Brandon did all of the graphic work and paint schemes. Paxton and Kauffman will drive cars painted exactly like the Al Hamilton team cars of the 1980s. Steve Smith Sr., drove a Rahmer team car painted like the "Black Bandit" of old. The old Apple Chevy car was there with Steve Stambaugh behind the wheel.

Okay, well, build it and they will come? Boy, did they come. There was an autograph session beforehand. The first 500 fans would receive posters of all 12 drivers, all on one poster. Bring old programs, helmets, wing panels, the autograph deal took darn close to three hours. This was going to be a success, a home run. Perfect weather—a racy track, even if it was a Wednesday night.

It became something else—something nothing to do with money. All sorts of racing folks showed up.

There was Davey Brown, still working on sprint cars. Here comes Bill Gettle, longtime machinist (and Flathead expert) out of Lebanon, PA. "Haven't been to a race in 20 years," he says.

Look—there's Al Hamilton and his family, 86-yearsyoung and looking good. Walt Dyer, Harry Fletcher, Dave Esh, Joe Harz, Keith Kauffman had Kathy and his family. Other drivers had families as well. Paxton's family was in the stands, everybody was hugging, backslapping, shaking hands. Tears were shed—this was to be a "racing reunion."

Things went without a hitch. Paxton hopped in his car cold-turkey. Promised his wife and others that he would not really race: but still, they worried. He did as he said he would do. Others, the younger ones, did race. Billy Pauch is still racing and winning. Most of them had retired only a few years ago.

I spent my time in Paxton's pit. It was hard to believe it was all happening. but it did. Lynn seemed to have more fans stop by than anyone. Some were even quite young. I didn't see him sign the front of any t-shirts, but the back of a lot of them.

All the drivers were enjoying themselves. Fred and Debbie were constantly trying to keep all happy. They did a great job. The fans in the packed stands were constantly cheering and clapping as MRN announcer Steve Post and Speedway announcer Wayne Harper kept them entertained with driver interviews. It was shown on Dirt Vision with some nostalgic film clips from the past thrown in.

I awoke the next morning, and the first thought was— *Did this really happen?* Yes, it really did. "Wait till next year," says Rahmer. Okay well, let's digest this first...

It felt good. It tasted good. Good for the drivers. Good for the fans. Good for Sprint Car Racing. Look out, folks. Hard to tell what comes next. But if it's anything like this, Sprint Car Racing is about to get a whole lot better.

Thank you, Fred and Debbie Rahmer, and Brandon and Freddy for the memories—from all of us.

Compromise Reached for Camping in the Membership Recreation Area

EMMR has reached a compromise with Latimore Township regarding members' camping in the Membership Recreation Area of Latimore Valley Fairgrounds. Camping is only allowed during the events listed below and the amount of days depends on the amount of days that the event is scheduled. The fee for camping is \$25 for the event.

If the event is one-day only, you may camp *the day before, the event day, and the day after* the event. Then you must remove your RV and all items from your campsite.

For a two-day event, you may camp *two days before, the 2 event days, and two days after* the event. Then you must remove your RV and all items from your campsite.

For a three-day event, you may camp *three days before, the 3 event days, and three days after* the event. Then you must remove your RV and all items.

Do you want an exciting volunteer position at EMMR? Do you want to work up-close with the many racing objects within the museum? Do you have a love of the sport and are fascinated with the history of racing? If so, please read on.

Currently, I am working on an inventory of the museum. Last year the museum board purchased the PastPerfect inventory system. This computer inventory program

is used by the top museums across the country. The PastPerfect system is an in-depth inventory program. Due to the depth of the system, it takes time to correctly enter inventory into the system. Last year, after the installation of the

program, I began with an inventory of the Chris

As I commenced with the inventory, I had a

futuristic plan. I believed this inventory would take six to eight years to complete. Plus, after two to three years, a re-inventory would have to take place behind me. That was the plan as I began.

Now, I have scrubbed all thoughts of sticking to that time frame. As I march forward with this inventory, the time frame will be greater. I have to be realistic, there is no time frame for the inventory completion. Still, I do realize in about two years there will be a need for a re-inventory to occur behind me.

At this point, the inventory has become a seven-day-a-week



with mid-mounted engines. Champ cars have sculpted undersides to create ground effects and prominent wings to create downforce. The cars would use a different aerodynamic kit on the occasions they raced on an oval.

EMMR's Third Sunday Roundtables are usually held from March through November and located in the upper floor of the Museum. The roundtable is scheduled from 1 pm to 3 pm, but many arrive early to enjoy the museum exhibits and chat with other race fans. The Gift Shop is usually open on those days and snacks are available. There is plenty of seating available, so bring friends and family.

project. I am taking objects, mainly boxes of racing programs, home with me so that I can accomplish inventory during the week. There is no break from the inventory.

With this large task taking place, I have been busy taking college-level classes in collections management, working on being certified in museum collections management. I hope to complete the classes early next year.

With this amount of work taking place, I have to admit there is a degree of burnout coming on. So, I now realize I cannot do this on my own. There is too much inventory in the museum. Just in the library alone, we have over 8,000 racing programs and over 5,000 books. In the past year, I have inventoried over 2,000 objects.

I am seeking individual(s) that would be interested in helping with the museum inventory. I would like to find someone that has PastPerfect experience, but I am willing to train the right individual(s). Anyone with a library or museum background would be a great help.

I know this sounds cliché, but we have to work as a team. With PastPerfect, we must use the system as I set it up, no one can vary even the slightest amount from the system now in place. I am looking at having someone to help with the inventory out in the museum. I am also looking for someone to work exclusively on the PastPerfect and do some detailed work behind what I have entered.

The task will include working on a computer making entries into the PastPerfect program. There will also be some photography work as each object has to be photographed for inventory records. We have a camera in use at the museum.

If you are interested in helping with the museum's inventory, please let me know. EMMR has so much great history that we will be documenting and preserving for future generations.

Vintage Indy Comes East – The Vintage Indy Registry at Schenley Park

As you might have guessed from the title of this column, I'm am passionate about IndyCar racing. I love the latest generation IndyCars but also those from IndyCar racing's past—which dates way back to the year 1909. While I was fortunate to attend a handful of IndyCar races in the late 1960s

and early 1970s, most of the events I have attended came much later, so for me there is more than six decades of history that I didn't have the opportunity to directly experience.

Today, thanks to some fine racing museums and vintage racing organizations, I have been able to view in person some of those great historic cars of yesteryear. Seeing them in per-

son was an amazing experience, but there is no substitute for hearing the sounds and experiencing the sights of these exquisite race cars in action. Imagine what it would be like to see, hear, and smell some of the most famous and unique Indy race cars of all time. Race cars like those incredible Board Track racers popular in the 1920s, the early Offy-powered Roadsters, or Andy Granatelli's Turbine cars of the late 1960s, or my personal favorite, the famous NOVI racers which competed off-and-on at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway for over twenty years.

Fortunately thanks to the Vintage Indy Registry everyone now can experience the sights, sounds, and smells of these beasts of motor-racing's past.

Vintage Indy Registry was founded in 2017 by Michael Lashmett and Ron

Nelson and is dedicated to the history and preservation of Indianapolis Championship Cars. Nelson hails from the Midwest and made a career of photography with Competition Press, covering events that included races at Indianapolis, Road America, the Milwaukee Mile, and Watkins Glen. Lashmett, who worked as a crew member under famed Indywinning chief mechanic George Bignotti on the Vel's Parnelli Jones and Patrick Racing Indianapolis entries, is an incredible asset to the Registry and brings a wealth of historicalracing knowledge and technical expertise to the organization.

Currently the Vintage Registry consists of more than 80 historic cars ranging from the 1930 Miller-Schofield Special built by Myron Stevens, and currently owned by Jeff Urwinall; all the way to the 1998 Riley & Scott Aurora, currently owned by Bob Receveur. Some of my favorites include: the 1947 Aggajanian Kurtis formerly driven by Walt Faulkner; the 1953 Kurtis Kraft 500B #365/ Offenhauser driven by Pat Flaherty; the 1961 Kimberly Cooper Special driven by Jack Brabham that started the rear engine revolution; the famous wedgeshaped 1968 STP-sponsored Lotus Turbine; Al Unser's famous 1970 Johnny Lightning Special; brother Bobby Unser's Pole Winning 1972 Olsonite Eagle; the very rare Vel's Parnelli Jones Racing AAR Eagle #7228/Turbo Drake-Offy driven under the Samsonite banner by Joe Lenard; Teo Fabi's Quaker State 1990 March Porsche; a 1965 Gerhardt/Ford driven by Walt Hansgen as the MG Liquid Suspension Special; and notable designer Bob Riley's 1974 Reily/Drake Offy driven by Roger McCluskey.

While the Vintage Indy Registry conducts static displays and track-time at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, World Wide Technology Raceway, Road America, we were all recently provided an opportunity to experience these historic cars right here in Pennsylvania. The weekend of July 24–25, 2021, I attended the annual Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix (PVGP) at Schenley Park, where for the first time the cars of the Vintage Indy Registry were featured.

The PVGP was first established in 1983 and I have been a regular attendee there since 2014. The event has become one

of the top vintage car-shows and historic racing events in the United States and at the same time raised over \$6 million for Autism research.

About a dozen cars of the Indy Registry participated, the oldest being a 1932 Miller/Ford constructed by legendary race car designer and builder Harry Miller.

Other notable cars participating included the 1972 Dan Gurney Racing Olsonite Eagle currently owned by Phillipe de Lespinay of Newport Beach, California. This is the car that legendary driver Bobby Unser put on pole for the 1972 Indy 500.

Also participating was my personal favorite, the 1968 Lotus 56 Turbine that Joe Leonard qualified on pole and nearly won the 1968 Indy 500. This extremely rare and valuable car is chassis #1 of the

4 Lotus 56's constructed by legendary builder Colin Chapman, and is currently owned by Bruce Linsmeyer of Orlando, Florida. Seeing this car in a static display is great but hearing the unique sound of the turbine power was an experience I will never forget.

Leading the vintage IndyCars onto the track was a Johnny Lightning inspired John Cooper Works Mini driven by the two-time Indianapolis 500 winner Al Unser Jr. who serves as the Vintage Indy Registry's Honorary Race Director.




Bruce Larson's Lyndwood Front End Dragster is One-of-a-Kind
